

# Memory Labs: Preserving Our Stories



# What are Memory Labs?

- Memory labs are meant to be free spaces where patrons can digitize their photos, documents, audiovisual recordings, and other formats (California State Library, n.d.).
- The idea was conceived by the District of Columbia Public Library (DCPL) and funded by the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) through the National Leadership Grant (Memory Lab Network, n.d.).
- Their goal was to build Memory Lab digital preservation programs in public libraries across the U.S. based on the DCPL Memory Lab model (Memory Lab Network, n.d.).





# Where to implement it?

- The institution I have chosen to work with is the <u>Sacramento Public Library</u> (SPL).
- Its first library, the Sacramento Free Public Library, was opened on June 14, 1879 and was a collaboration between some of Sacramento's leading citizens of the time (Sacramento Public Library, n.d.).
- Today, SPL has 28 branches which serve residents of the greater Sacramento area. One of its core values includes providing access to resources that help their patrons achieve their goals and supporting everyone's freedom to choose for themselves what they read and learn (SacLib, 2024).
- Its strategic plan for 2024-2027 includes the goal of fostering a lifelong love of learning and reading among their patrons by promoting access to a wide range of materials (SacLib, 2024).



### Goals/Objectives

- Community members will gain the skills and the confidence to digitize, care for, and manage their own histories.
- The library will start to develop a digital preservation workstation that meets the transfer needs of their community collections.
- Library staff will gain practical knowledge in digitization, design usercentered programming, and develop plans to continue and sustain the Memory Lab.



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### Guidelines/Policies

- Sacramento Public Library board of directors and library staff will be responsible for developing the guidelines and policies for implementing the Memory Labs.
- The Los Angeles Public library website has guides that include information on what materials can be digitized, the equipment is provided, patron responsibilities, and even an in-depth online orientation before using Memory Labs.
- The <u>California State Library</u> and <u>California</u>
   <u>Revealed</u> offers additional information and guidance on how to implement Memory Labs at public libraries, and how to apply for grant funding.

# Timeline: 1 year

#### **APR-JUN**

Train staff and develop workshops/programs and marketing for memory lab.

#### OCT-DEC

Test run program, survey patrons, and collect data to improve program.

#### **JAN-MAR**

Get approval from board of directors to allocate funds for program.

#### JUL-SEPT

Acquire digitization equipment and space for Memory Lab.



## Marketing (Patrons)

Use existing social media pages to promote events/workshops around the Memory Lab.

### Create engaging events/workshops around the Memory Lab

- Open-house style events where the community could bring their family photos, videos, or analog materials to the Memory Lab and learn how to digitize them.
- Preservation workshop series (photo, digitization, textile, paper, art, genealogy, etc.)



# Marketing (Staff/Stakeholders)

- Reach out to community stakeholders like California Revealed and the California State Library for guidance on how to implement and sustain the Memory Lab program.
- Promote the program to staff and provide incentives to invest in professional development (e.g. on the job training).

### Evaluation

- Library staff could create a paper or online survey for patrons to complete anonymously at the end of each session.
- Surveys would collect information on the number of lab users, number of hours, formats transferred, common issues, and feedback.
- The data compiled from the surveys could help SPL quantify the level of services provided by the program.
- Surveys and interviews would evaluate the significance of the Memory Lab for the institution, and articulate findings of how to create and sustain a successful program.
